Mother: I've seen a real change in Victoria's mind, which was my goal because I have two other kids, and they didn't go to college either, but they have a career. They're electricians, so they're okay. But with her, I try to teach her that college is very important for her to achieve all of her goals that she has.

Mother: And this program has helped us a lot because it's kind of like they're guiding us through it. I don't feel alone. I don't feel like maybe how my mom felt so many years ago. Maybe she felt alone. There was no one to push her and teach her what to do, so I want to educate myself so I can help her out.

Daughter: It helped me get more confident, because before, I thought about college but I didn't really care, I guess you could say. Like it wasn't really one of my plans to go. And now with this program, it's been helping me a lot and now I want to go to college.

Mother: I see myself back in college, I do. I really do. And I think I have the support of Con Mi MADRE. They're going to help me a lot and I have the support of my family.

Daughter: What I see for my future is, first of all, graduating from college and all that, and seeing myself working as a nurse because that's what I want to do.
